







left home a couple of years ago, we knew it was time to update the interior of our tired looking house,' remembers Gina Mills, an event planner with a keen interest in interiors. 'We've lived here for over 15 years, and it's been a lovely family home but living as a couple again, we wanted to make better use of the space and update the look.'

On the recommendation of a friend, Gina appointed Caz Myers from Caz Myers Design (cazmyers.com) to oversee the renovation and improve the outdated layout. 'The kitchen was a warren of small rooms with a cloakroom and utility area and it didn't feel like a space to relax in or entertain,' explains Gina. 'Caz could see that we weren't making the most of the space and suggested opening up the back of the house into a light-filled, open-plan living area with a breakfast bar.'

The ground floor was stripped of the smaller rooms and Caz proposed black metal-framed windows to bring in the light and create an uninterrupted view of the garden. She also suggested bringing London Stone exposed brickwork into the scheme, in keeping with the period of the house. And to soften the natural materials, Caz thoughtfully curated the couple's beloved artwork across a feature wall, which designates the more formal dining area. Using colours from the gallery, she designed a luxurious, velvet banquette for relaxing, with a scattering of colourful cushions.

'I probably spend most of my time in the kitchendiner now as it has such a friendly vibe and has evolved into a more sociable space,' confesses Gina.

'We're also keen on the benefits of plants, natural light and eating outdoors and we knew Caz had really understood our brief when she suggested an outdoor seating area. It's versatile and easy to maintain.'

Another difficult space was the room between the kitchen and the sitting room, which had become nothing more than a corridor. 'It was a waste of space because it wasn't really used for anything other than passing through,' recalls Gina. 'Caz knows we're both keen music lovers and her idea to create a snug with a space for the piano and our precious vinyl collection was the perfect solution. The dark paint colour creates such a moody atmosphere which we love.'

Upstairs, Caz has updated the main bedroom using muted colours and contemporary wooden furniture, and the en-suite makeover has included interesting tiling and a floating vanity unit to create a more spacious feel. 'I'm especially pleased with the upstairs study as it's such a useful room as we both often work from home,' enthuses Gina. 'The daring, dark paintwork on the window surround, another great Caz idea, and the exposed brickwork have brought this unused room literally back to life and given us an exciting new home for the next chapter of our lives.'
